





The benefits of debating in the classroom

The following document details 1 of 7 innovative ideas as shared by Vashti Nepal, a participant of the Axis Education Forum 2016. Here, you will find: information on the benefits of debate in schools and resources to help you introduce debate in your classroom.

Vashti Nepal introduced the idea of **debate in schools** as a way to engage learners and liven up classroom curriculum and extracurriculars.

#### What is debate?

- A structured argument between opponents around an evenly weighted topic
- The topic is revealed to both sides simultaneously
- Both sides prepare
- The argument must occur in front of unbiased judges who listen and allocate marks
- A win must be awarded and a reason must be given for a win, so as to foster constructive criticism
- Debate formats: Policy, Parliamentary, Karl Popper, Lincoln Douglas, Oxford, World Schools Style

### What matters?

- Factors that are relevant in a debate: a learner's logic, argument, knowledge, style, strategy and ability to work in a team
- Factors that are irrelevant in a debate: a learner's wealth, school, accent, vocabulary, age, race, gender and sexual orientation
- Debate can be adapted to any classroom, even those in resource constrained environments (doesn't require special equipment)

#### What are the benefits?

Using debate in the classroom can help learners grasp essential critical thinking and presentation skills. Some additional core competencies fostered by classroom debate include:

- Abstract thinking, analysis and problem solving
- Research and organisation
- Active listening and comprehension
- Language, ability to express oneself and public speaking
- Teamwork and cooperation
- Research indicates that learners who participate in debate have better test scores in English and reading specifically, and in general standardised tests more broadly
- Additionally, research suggests that learners who debate in school are more 'college ready' than their peers
